



Kondoli village and its role in world war II



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Abstract

The village of Kondoli the Telavi municipality is mentioned in the following written sources: Vakhushti Bagrationi's "Description of the Kingdom of Georgia" (4: 542,6,8; 547.2), John Bagrationi's "Description of Kartli-Kakheti" (Bagrationi 1986: 68), XVII-XVIII JSC Historical Documents (Chronicles 1897: 492; Doc. Soci. Hist. 1940: 331; 1953: 274; Georgian Law No. 1965: 409; 1972: 216, 653; 1974: 648; 1981: 59, 742, 1985: 487, 661, 662), by Johann Guildenstadt "A Journey to Georgia (Giuldenstedt 1964: 41-43, 263). Vakhushti Bagrationi tells us about the village Kondoli: "Bodbe ... the bishop sits, the shepherd of the sword before the Kondoli ... and there are his saddles on the sword before the Kondole and Manava" (Acts 4: 542,6-8). Kondoli in XVII-XVIII centuries belonged to the Alaverdi Temple (Georgian Law No. 1972: 312). Condolences were owned by Andronikashvilis (Doc. Soci. Hist. 1940: 331; 1953: 274). World War II was a large-scale war on its scale. All the republics of the Soviet Union, including Georgia, found themselves in a state of war. This war, perpetrated by the Germans, was perceived by the peoples of the Soviet Union as a "Great Patriotic War" as each of them faced destruction. Participation in the war was perceived as the struggle of each republic for its homeland and the survival of the united states from fascism, as the plans for the conquest of Vermicht were similar to those of the Soviet Union and rendered them fascist. More than half a million people, some 200,000 of them dead or missing, we're left with 100,000. The village of Condoli with its brave hero was no exception. Many young people were recruited from this village, many of whom had never returned home.

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1 Introduction

Condol --- Village in Telavi Municipality. It is located on the plain of Alazani, on the left bank of the Kisiskhevi River. 460 meters above sea level, 6 kilometers from Telavi.

Kondol is one of those historic villages in Georgia, whose existence and sweet-bitter life shaped the famous history of the Georgian nation (Teachman & Tedrow, 2004; Waldenström & Frey, 2008; Escobar, 1989; Eichengreen, 1994). It was one of the most beautiful parts of the beautiful Alazani Valley from ancient times, but over time the indigenous peoples gradually settled to the south and formed the geographical area of today's rural development. Thakara sun and the highly fertile Alazani valley have always provided favorable conditions for crop production. The village has long been known for producing famous wheat bread (wheat varieties). It was from Kona-Kondi that the wheat of the Dohlites was confined to a village called Con-Dohl, then the Condole.

Kondol's children from ancient times were distinguished by their bravery. It is noteworthy that Solomon Lionidze's adviser to King Erekle was a Condolean and had a native, large wine cellar in the Condole (today there are vineyards in the village of Condole called by the locals as Lionidze's caves. King Erekle was a frequent visitor (Swuste *et al.*, 2014; Wansink *et al.*, 2008; Gordon, 1998; Robinette & Fraumeni 1978). Condoleans have been a source of income for viticulture. Kondol's praise is also known for the character of the great Georgian historian Vakhushti Batonishvili. She writes: "Good wine, great Condolean."

World War II, the most extensive war ever carried on any Georgian family. These are not exaggerated words. We will find out from the materials below.

Contents: All the republics of the Soviet Union, including Georgia, have found themselves in a state of war. The day after the declaration of war, mobilization began in Georgia the next day (Four volumes of the history of Georgia (from ancient times to the end of XX century), Volume I, Tb. 2012,1, 369) (Netter, 2014; Kang *et al.*, 2006; Pesonen *et al.*, 2010; Forstmeier *et al.*, 2009; Antara *et al.*, 2019).

Here, the materials provided by us are given in the village of Telavi district. List of recruits for the Condolezza example. All these data, which are kept in the Telavi Regional Archive, belong to 1939-1940, 1942-1943.

We would also like to include excerpts from the letters that are kept in our private library. These letters are dedicated to Vasil Keadze, an ancestor of our family (here we want to sleep that three Keadze families are living in the village of Kondoli in Telavi municipality) who fought in World War II and never returned. The letters of this person also show what role the Georgians played in this war. Style is everywhere ([Davidson et al., 1990](#); [Worth & Kagan, 1970](#); [Bon, 1988](#); [Kaup et al., 1994](#)).

12. 12. A letter written in 39 indicates that the war had just begun. Excerpt from the letter: "Dear Parents, Stay on the Road 7 Days and Nights. I sent two letters out of the way, one I came in then and one will be. " We speculated that Vasil Keadze should go to war in December 1939. The latter letter and the letter of M. Napareuli School Representative are entitled to say this. Chapanashvili's letter, dated 17. 10. 39, which reads as follows: "Hurry up because if you came to the army, if you had sent the message, you would have had it taken by November. . . " (We are talking about salary - emphasize ours in M.) (Private archive).

In his letter, Vasil Keadze expressed no concern about the war or the problems there. On the contrary, every letter states that he is fine. Here are some excerpts from his letters: "Parents, if you ask about my presence, I'm fine. Abashidze and I are together. Charbadze has left us and we are only in the city again. "---- This letter is dated 14. 02. 40." Dear Parents! Excited by the enthusiastic excitement and outrageous salutation of the giant. . . Parents think my wife and mother are apologizing for being late because we changed the apartment so we didn't write to you soon. I am alone from the condo so Georgians are in the bloom with every one of my friends. " This letter is numbered 19.03.40 (Private archive).

Lastly, we would like to cite the last letter, which highlights Vasil Keadze's high dignity and, most importantly, the sacrifice of his homeland. This letter is dated 27.11. 1941: "Salam, a passionate and passionate love devotee to you, dear, old-fashioned parents. For the first time, we wish you health and everlasting life, which are essential and essential to human life. The ideas you set for the future of life will all be fulfilled without interruption. A lively and jigsaw-loving salute to dear brother and sister. I wish you good health and everlasting life, to stand in the way of life and to devote yourself to life. . . Of course, your parents, mom, and dad, as well as your siblings and other relatives as a fan are interested in the story of a migrant child. To grow weary and tormented at birth for the sake of a child for the sake of the child, I grew up and did nothing to benefit you. I'm fine now, not at all; I am neither skinny nor light-skinned in the way I am good at. I jumped from the self-pilot (airliner) once I landed on a parachute. We are trained to shoot down invaders on the ground and shoot back and destroy the opponent. It's just hard to say whether you will come back or not. So one month later we will go to the front. I am the commander. Once again you remind me that you have a lot

of hard work to do and you will be saddened and saddened and saddened many times, and who knows that tears are pouring down on your longing (here's the meaning of a Georgian mother's pen). Don't worry and worry about me just think of the one who stayed at home as I was not born to you and if you expect what joy you will see! Do not worry only if you manage or mix or sell very warm pellets. And if you can earn some money send me when we have the second letter, then send it. Letter to Subscribe Subscribe All that happened in 5 months 6 months go to your story I don't know. Here's a list of all the crops you came in or whether you had any bread. Good luck to your parents! Goodbye. Vasil "(Private archive).

2. Conclusion

Village Kondoli, one of the most important villages in Kakheti, Telavi Municipality. Kondole is rich in its historical past, traditions, churches, and monasteries. Therefore, all of the above-mentioned villages of Kondol has played a major role in World War II. Personally, two men from our family were recruited, one killed (Vasil Keadze) and one returned wounded (Firuz Keadze, who was wounded in the arm).



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
